Recognising this, the UAE, through initiatives like the World Police Summit, encourages global collaboration in leveraging technologies to stay ahead of criminals who harness new technologies for nefarious purposes.

Advanced technologies such as noise radar technology, pioneered by Abu Dhabi Police, augment noise monitoring and policing. 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
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

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

Mohammed bin Rashid unveils Ramadan initiative, pardons 691 prisoners



HIS Highness Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum, Vice-President and Prime Minister of the UAF and Ruler of Dubai, has directed the release of 691 prisoners of various nationalities from Dubai's rehabilitation and correctional centres ahead of the Holy Month of Ramadan.

Chancellor Essam Issa Al Humaidan, Attorney General of Dubai, explained that the pardon reflects HH Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid's commitment to reuniting the pardoned individuals with their families, offering them a chance for a fresh start and community reintegration.

Additionally, HH Sheikh Mohammed launched a Dhs1 billion education fund through the Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum Global Initiatives (MBRGI) to

support disadvantaged families worldwide ahead of Ramadan.

This initiative, named the Mothers' Endowment campaian, aims to provide educational materials, social programmes, and school facilities for millions of underprivileged individuals globally.

HE Mohammad Al Gergawi, Secretary General of MBRGI, said that the fund's allocations will be conducted in collaboration with humanitarian organisations.

UAE passport gets validity extension from 5 to 10 years

CHAIRED by His Highness Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum. Vice-President and Prime Minister of the UAE and Ruler of Dubai, the UAE Cabinet has approved extending the validity of the UAE passport from 5 to 10 years for individuals aged 21 years and above.

HH Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid wrote on the social media platform X (formerly Twitter): "The executive regulations of the Federal Law on Citizenship and Passport have been amended, and the validity period of the UAE passport has been increased from 5 to 10 years for those aged 21 years and above. The authorities will provide more facilities and comprehensive digital services as part of the new amendments."

Meanwhile, the UAE Cabinet reviewed significant developments in the country's labour market.



HH Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid announced, "The UAE ranked first globally in labour disputes, according to the Global Competitiveness Yearbook. It also topped the world in its ability to attract talent, according to the Prosperity Index, ranking third globally.

During the same session, the UAE Cabinet adopted a new structure for the Ministry of Human Resources and Emiratisation and established a coordinating council for the labour market to enhance its stability and competitiveness.

HH Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid stated, "The workforce is the real engine of the economy. Ensuring their affairs are properly managed and protecting their rights are fundamental to the growth of our national economy."

New taxation law for foreign banks takes effect in Dubai

HIS Highness Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum, Vice-President and Prime Minister of the UAE and Ruler of Dubai, has issued Law No. (1) of 2024 regarding the taxation of foreign banks operating in Dubai.

The law applies to all foreign banks in the emirate, excluding those licensed in

the Dubai International Financial Centre (DIFC). Foreign banks will be subject to a 20 per cent tax on their annual taxable

It details principles for calculating taxable income, tax filing, and audit procedures. The law outlines the rights of foreign banks and branches licensed by the Central Bank

of the UAE, including procedures for tax audit results and objections.

Violations will be determined by the Chairman of the Executive Council of Dubai, with penalties capped at Dhs500,000, doubling for repeat offences within two years to a maximum of Dhs1 million.

ETCC greenlights Dhs6.4 billion Nafis budget for 2024

The session, also attended by HH Sheikh Abdullah bin Zayed Al Nahyan, Minister of Foreign Affairs and Vice Chair of the ETCC Board, saw approval of approximately Dhs6.4 billion for the 2024 Nafis programme.



Notably, over 41,800 citizens joined the private sector in 2023, with Dhs4.2 billion



disbursed through the Nafis programme. Additionally, the Board lauded the signing of more than 51 agreements with strategic partners across various sectors.




Saif bin Zayed attends 41st Arab Interior Ministers Council meeting

Another topic covered in the talk was early Arabic calligraphy, with the speaker giving detailed descriptions of the methods used in the production of centuriesold copies of the Quran, produced on leather parchment and painstakingly written in gold.

Highlighting the significance of Islamic arts in fostering cultural understanding, the lecture underlined the UAE's commitment to preserving religious and cultural values and promoting intercultural dialogue through art.

The lecture was moderated by calligraphy artist Maryam Al Balooshi and featured pre-recorded contributions from Khalid Aljallaf, President of the Emirates Society for Arabic Calligraphy; visual media artist Alya Alsanad; and visual artist Patricia Millns, discussing how Islamic arts, such as calligraphy, architecture, and decoration continue to influence artists and designers in the UAE and beyond.



At WPS 2024, a significant workshop on the impact of GPT & ChatGPT on law enforcement provided salient insights into policing's future, highlighting the transformative potential of generative AI technologies.

Presight, an IT service management company, presented an Al-driven analytics platform that aims to assist investigators in reducing investigation time, enhancing policing, and fostering community trust. The platfrom is capable of swiftly processing vast amounts of multi-source data.

Additionally, Presight showcased an investigative solution suite powered by an Al virtual assistant, aiding authorities in understanding natural language queries, accessing critical information, and managing evidence. The company also demonstrated a digital forensics platform incorporating advanced

Workshops on responsible Al in law enforcement, led by the United Nations Interregional Crime and Justice Research Institute and the International Criminal Police Organization (INTERPOL), highlighted the ethical deployment of Al technologies. Meanwhile, collaborative sessions with INTERPOL on drone technology addressed the technical and forensic aspects of using unmanned utility vehicles (UAVs) in crime fighting.









EYE IN THE SKY

During the summit, the Ministry of Interior (MoI), in collaboration with Abu Dhabi Police, unveiled a new technology called the Smart Traffic Signal Drone. This innovation eliminates the need for immediate deployment of police officers to manage traffic during signal malfunctions, designed specifically for emergencies and traffic light failures.

Developed locally by the Mol's

An Airbus helicopter that aims to safely carry passengers in demanding environments

Innovation Centre, the drone will ensure uninterrupted vehicle flow and enhance road safety. The smart traffic signal drone, crafted through 3D printing, offers a 25-minute operational window on a single charge, serving as a temporary aid until police units are deployed. After two months of development and testing, including trials in windy conditions, the drone is set for an official launch soon.

The Mol also showcased the UAE Sniper. Developed by Ajman Police, this device utilises paintballs to mark suspected criminals or locations, aiding law enforcement efforts. During its three-month trial period, the UAE Sniper demonstrated an impressive 98 per cent accuracy rate. Operated through air pressure, it offers a non-lethal method for law enforcement to identify and monitor suspicious activities.

Meanwhile, Zenith Technologies, a long-standing partner of Dubai Police, showcased its groundbreaking Al EagleEye Intelligent Patrol technology. This revolutionary solution, embedded within the Policing Lightbar, integrates Al-powered drones to provide real-time surveillance and situational awareness for law enforcement patrols.

The precursor to this technology is already integrated into Dubai Police's fleet. Its latest advancements with lightbar-embedded AI drone capabilities have garnered further recognition, as it becomes an integral component of Saudi Arabia's new smart fleet. This was highlighted during the World Defence Show in Riyadh in February 2024.

INNOVATION IN FORENSIC SCIENCE

Generative AI enables forensic scientists to create realistic simulations of crime scenes, aiding evidence interpretation and courtroom presentations. As forensic science evolves, the role of generative Al promises to be indispensable in unravelling crime mysteries. This role of generative AI in forensic science took centre stage in both the exhibition and workshops within WPS 2024.

Dubai Police highlighted its use of virtual autopsy. "The latest technology we have is a virtual autopsy, what we used to see in movies, when they see a corpse, the doctor takes it, opens its chest and sees the organs, and this process takes approximately five hours. Now, we use artificial intelligence



so that we skip this process to a small process that determines for us whether we need an autopsy or not," Major General Ahmad Thani bin Ghalita Al Muhairi, Director of the General Department of Forensics and Criminology at Dubai Police, told the media.

Meanwhile, a multi-faceted emergency response management platform, similar to one used by the UAE's National Emergency Crisis and Disaster Management Authority was amongst the standout innovations in forensic science. This platform integrates data from multiple service providers, enabling first responders to react more swiftly and effectively in emergencies, thereby reducing the impact on lives and property.



ENHANCING K9 UNIT TRAINING

The summit also delved into the innovative application of AI in K9 units and their integration into SWAT operations, illustrating the dynamic convergence of technology and conventional policing methods.

For instance, forward-thinking law enforcement tools, such as robotic dogs, were also examined. These mechanical canines could soon enhance crime prevention and major raids, representing a stride towards a sci-fi reality. While they have yet to match the capabilities of real dogs, ongoing efforts persist.

"The robotic dogs currently functioning as sniffing dogs have not attained the proficiency of a standard dog, but we are actively researching and engaging with advanced companies on the topic of robotic dogs," remarked Lieutenant Colonel Salah Al Mazrouei, Director of the Dubai Police Security Inspection Department K9.

Meanwhile, at the summit, Worldwide K9 Academy (WWK9) showcased its K9 squads' proficiency in explosive detection, narcotic detection, security, patrol duties, and more. Additionally, the team highlighted how its innovative training methodologies and cutting-edge techniques contribute to the cultivation of stable, confident, and highly effective working dogs.

COMBATING FINANCIAL CRIMES

In a significant move to bolster the nation's capacity to investigate financial crimes, the UAE Executive Office of Anti-Money Laundering and Counter-Terrorism Financing (EO AMLCTF) and Dubai Police have signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) to strengthen their joint efforts in combating financial crimes. The MoU, inked by Hamid Al Zaabi, Director-General of the Executive Office for Anti-Money Laundering and Counter Terrorism Financing (AML/CFT), and Major General Expert Khalil Ibrahim Al Mansouri. Assistant Commander-in-Chief for Criminal Investigation Affairs at Dubai Police, underscores a deep commitment to collaborative actions in tackling money laundering and financial crimes.

Al Zaabi emphasised that the agreement will significantly enhance the UAE's capabilities in investigating and combating financial crimes. "Police forces serve as an indispensable pillar in the battle against financial crimes, spearheading investigations into suspected illicit activities and collaborating closely with

THE OPPENHEIMER PARADOX

Individual ambitions must be tempered with a sense of responsibility towards humanity to avoid catastrophic consequences, as depicted by the blockbuster biopic 'Oppenheimer'

ppenheimer, the blockbuster biopic about the race to build the first atomic bomb, has won seven Oscars after being nominated in 13 categories, during a ceremony held at the Dolby Theatre in Los Angeles last March. This event, eagerly awaited by cinema enthusiasts worldwide, serves as a celebration of the finest works and performances in Hollywood. The film won awards for Best Picture, Best Director, Best Actor, Best Supporting Actor, Best Editing, Best Cinematography, and Best Original Score.

The film, screened in cinemas in mid-2023, narrates the life of American theoretical physicist J. Robert Oppenheimer, director

of the Los Alamos Laboratory under the Manhattan Project during World War II. The mission of the individuals involved was to develop the world's first nuclear weapons, earning Oppenheimer the title "the father of the atomic bomb".

"Mr. President, I feel I have blood on my hands," Oppenheimer reportedly told then-US President Harry S. Truman after the dropping of the atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki, the very bombs he contributed to creating. These were the first and last atomic bombs used in warfare. However, Truman was infuriated, asserting he had the sole responsibility for the decision to use nuclear weapons against Japan. Truman reportedly remarked, "I never want to see that [expletive] in this office again." Nevertheless, in recognition of

his services, Oppenheimer was awarded the Medal for Merit by President Truman in 1946.

Perhaps the contradictions in Oppenheimer's life, along with the film's technical and production factors, propelled it to become one of the best films of 2023, according to the National Board of Review of Motion Pictures and the American Film Institute. Additionally, it grossed over \$900 million (Dhs3,300 million) in ticket sales, surpassing its production budget of \$100 million (Dhs367 million).

Most importantly, the film sparked a debate regarding nuclear armaments, rekindling the broader question of achieving nuclear balance to prevent a new world war. This balance, designed to deter major powers from unleashing their nuclear arsenals, prompts scrutiny regarding its efficacy in today's landscape. Some major powers persist in harbouring ambitions to dominate smaller nations, assert hegemony, or secure strategic advantages like access to warm waters, amongst other justifications for the potential use of nuclear weapons.

Throughout the film, we are immersed in the human and

political turmoils entwined with the nuclear research, culminating in the creation of the first two atomic bombs in the early 20th century. These conflicts transcend eras, becoming increasingly prevalent in our contemporary world, where tensions escalate, ambitions expand, and ideologies dictate state policies. The pursuit of chemical and nuclear armaments is no longer the exclusive domain of major powers; it extends to smaller states and even terrorist factions, posing a significant threat to global security.

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Responsibility in GENEROSITY

PUBLIC SAFETY

amadan is a time when people in the UAE take a break from the hustle of daily life to connect with their spiritual well-being, focusing on deepening their faith and practising Islamic ideals such as love, tolerance, giving, and kindness. However, it is also a time when beggars are most active and the UAE's police forces are reminding people that begging is a criminal offence, with an anti-begging crackdown in effect across the UAE until mid-April 2024.

If someone solicits money from you on the streets, be cautious, as the individual may appear sickly and impoverished but could be playing a role, cautioned the UAE police.

Dubai Police found that 90 per cent of the beggars they have apprehended in recent years consider begging to be their "profession". These individuals fabricate stories to elicit sympathy from potential donors, often pocketing thousands of dirhams after a day of begging. The police advise against aiding panhandlers, as those who assist them inadvertently support illegal activities. Citizens, residents, and visitors alike who offer alms may also fall victim to theft, cautioned the police.

On the first day of Ramadan 2024 alone, Dubai Police arrested 17 beggars as part of the 'Fight Begging' campaign. "The first day of Ramadan saw the arrest of 17 individuals, including 13 males and four females," stated Brigadier Ali Salem Al Shamsi, Director of the Suspects and Criminal Phenomena Department at Dubai Police.

The police underscored their commitment to eradicating the menace of panhandling while urging everyone to remain vigilant and report beggars,

particularly near mosques, markets, and residential areas, as these locations are common hotspots for begging activity.

'PROFESSIONAL' BEGGARS

In separate incidents before the start of Ramadan 2024, Dubai Police arrested two women carrying Dhs60,000 and Dhs30,000 in cash, respectively, earned solely through begging. One of the women exploited her child to elicit sympathy, resulting in the accumulation of thousands of dirhams. They were amongst approximately 1,700 beggars arrested in the emirate over the past four years.

Brigadier Dr Saeed Abdullah Al Qamzi, Assistant Director of the General Department of Investigations for Criminal Operations Affairs at Dubai Police, stated to the media in March 2024, "Beggars

are professionals adept at exploiting the compassion and generosity of people. They do not deserve our sympathy during Ramadan."

Al Qamzi added, "Begging is also a negative behaviour that threatens the security and well-being of our country."

Last year, Abu Dhabi Police arrested a woman who drove a luxury car, parked it at a distance from mosques, and then sought alms amongst mosque-goers. The possession of such vehicle and the substantial sum of money collected showed that the beggar had a higher net worth than the individuals she solicited charity from.

Another instance that showed how panhandlers could amass a huge sum in just a few days was the arrest of a beggar in Dubai with a fake artificial limb, where he had stacked Dhs300.000 cash. This highlights the fact that many beggars employ diverse tactics to elicit sympathy, and the public should not be deceived.

Furthermore, a report from the Dubai Municipality revealed that one beggar could earn up to Dhs270.000 per month or an average of Dhs9,000 per day. This income exceeded what many hardworking, honest, and skilled professionals in the UAE earn.

This dishonesty undermines the trust and goodwill within society while reducing the availability of aid for genuine charitable causes and individuals truly in need.

UNUSUAL SCHEMES

Dubai Police have observed unusual begging methods, such as a European woman who worked as a model in her home country. She visited a Dubai mall wearing an expensive dress and holding a sign that read, "I want money, I want a rich husband." Another woman was spotted with a sign stating, "Need money

to open a clinic." Both individuals faced appropriate action as a result.

Regarding the two female panhandlers arrested in Dubai last month, it was found that they entered the UAE on visit visas. Similarly, the majority of the 1,700 beggars arrested in the emirate during Ramadan over the past four years arrived in the country on visit visas with the intention of making begging their profession.

Brigadier Al Qamzi of Dubai Police stated, "Around 90 per cent of arrested beggars are visitors, coming to the UAE during Ramadan for easy money, knowing it is a prosperous country where people are inclined to help. We have a dedicated team of officers to crack down on beggars."

EXPLOITING COMPASSION

Al Qamzi highlighted that begging is not a civilised practice and often surges during Ramadan, as beggars seek to

capitalise on the charitable atmosphere of the holy month.

He cautioned people against being deceived by beggars, emphasising that begging can be used for other criminal activities, such as burglary and the exploitation of vulnerable individuals to illicitly raise funds.

"Most beggars are fraudsters, they come during Ramadan on a visit visa and loiter around mosques. Don't sympathise with them, instead give your help or money to charity organisations in the country," Al Qamzi said.

Furthermore, he advised the public against engaging in solicitation or fundraising through social media channels. "People should be careful when they receive messages or posts on social networks regarding poor people who need help as most of it is not true or is just another scam," Al Qamzi warned.

KNOW WHERE YOUR HELP GOES

To an onlooker, begging may seem like an individual's attempt to cope with personal misfortune. However, the reality is that many begging activities are intertwined with the international underworld, serving as an avenue for various trans-border crimes, from trafficking to terrorism. According to the International Criminal Police Organization, funds collected through begging often find their way into illicit activities such as theft, terrorism, or the smuggling of drugs and other contraband.

Even more reprehensible is the fact that certain individuals exploit innocent children for the purpose of begging.

In August 2023, Dubai Police arrested a group of five men, often accompanied by women and children, who would approach individuals claiming to need financial assistance to return to their home countries.

A spokesperson for Dubai Police disclosed to the media that this tactic was employed to elicit money from sympathetic individuals, with the group repeating the scheme in different locations. "This gang from Asia had number plates from neighbouring

countries. This case exemplifies how begging is associated with the exploitation of children, the elderly, and individuals with disabilities to illegally raise funds," the official stated.

The UAE's zero-tolerance stance on begging was highlighted in May 2021 when three Arab women received fines of Dhs5,000 each, a six-month jail sentence, and subsequent deportation. The first suspect was discovered to have compelled her son, aged under eight, to beg on the streets of Dubai. The other two women similarly exploited their children for begging.

The group's operation was dismantled

after a concerned resident alerted Dubai Police to their presence near a shopping centre in the emirate. Police officers traced the child who led them to his mother. She admitted to being part of a group of women who had brought their children to beg in the UAE. The other two women were apprehended at Dubai Airport just before boarding their flight.

ISLAMIC PERSPECTIVE

The social repercussions of begging are universally negative as it undermines dignity. In a flourishing society, individuals are expected to find contentment and live responsibly.

Begging disrupts this societal framework, hindering the progression where children attend school, study diligently, and ultimately secure employment. The quick cash schemes employed by beggars set a detrimental example for others, with impressionable youngsters learning improper methods to earn money easily.

Those who succumb to the fabricated tales of beggars inadvertently perpetuate the practice within society, influencing their families, children, and companions to follow suit.

Many individuals hesitate to turn away beggars due to the belief that Islam extols charity as a virtue. While Islamic teachings indeed emphasise generosity, religious leaders in the UAE discourage people from falling prey to beggars outside mosques and other venues.

According to Talib Al Shehhi, Executive Director of Islamic Affairs and Endowments, begging is forbidden in Islam. "The Almighty Allah has enjoined

Types of begging

Begging is not confined to the UAE but is a global phenomenon. According to the United Nations, begging is interconnected with other forms of exploitation such as forced labour, coerced marriages, and criminal activities stemming from the trafficking of adults and children. Here are the different types of begging:

- Permanent: Some individuals engage in begging as a long-term activity, preferring it over traditional employment.
- **Temporary:** Others resort to begging due to temporary hardships. They may present fake documents, such as medical bills or receipts, to solicit donations.
 - **3 Occasional:** Certain beggars operate during specific events, such as Ramadan.
 - Forced: In some cases, families or criminal organisations compel elderly individuals, children, or disabled individuals to beg.

Al Shehhi has cautioned against individuals who seek their livelihood through objectionable methods, stating, "It is forbidden to engage in begging as a profession, exploiting the generosity of benevolent individuals."

ILLEGAL ONLINE FUNDRAISING

During the start of Ramadan 2024 last month, Dubai Police highlighted the increasing trend of people using social media to raise funds, supposedly to assist the needy, which is unlawful.

Under the Information Technology Crime Law of 2012, Article 5, individuals who use information technology to solicit or promote fundraising without a licence may face fines ranging from Dhs250,000 to Dhs500,000.

During Ramadan, police officers maintain a visible presence on the ground to ensure public safety and uphold order, while simultaneously monitoring cyber activity to prevent online crimes, including illegal solicitation.

Cybercrime is on the rise globally, and

simply clicking on a link can result in financial loss and expose email or social media contacts to similar fraudulent campaigns. Phishing, an old cybercrime tactic, involves sending messages with malicious links or attachments that, when clicked, introduce malware into the recipient's computer.

As is customary every year, police forces across the UAE host events and initiatives to raise awareness about cybercrime during Ramadan. They caution against falling prey to fake charity events or fundraisers. The recurring message is clear-don't make it easy for fraudsters by donating to unverified organisations.

EXTEND HELP THE RIGHT WAY

During Ramadan, we reflect on our blessings and feel compelled to share with others. Forwarding links on WhatsApp to solicit money or other forms of donations during the holy month is illegal. To raise funds, individuals must obtain a licence from the government and collaborate with licenced charitable organisations.

Ramadan fosters awareness of our privileges and blessings. However, police advise that responsible giving entails donating to legitimate and approved charities.



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ff the coast of the UAE, Emirati sailor Issa Mohammed Al Falasi embarked on a routine fishing trip in January, seeking the tranquillity of the open sea. As he navigated, his keen eyes caught a glimpse of something amiss in the distance.

A lone man was fighting desperately against the waves. Without hesitation, Al Falasi manoeuvred his vessel towards the man and pulled him from the clutches of the unforgiving sea. However, as he secured their safety, he was told by the man that he was not alone. His crewmates were also adrift in the sea.

They scoured the waters near the fishermen's boat for signs of life. Amidst the vast expanse of the ocean, he was able to rescue eight fishermen. Sadly, two had drowned.

After confirming their safety, Al Falasi swiftly headed to the nearest Coast Guard point. They promptly coordinated with the relevant emergency services, including Dubai Police and the ambulance. "The officials were fully prepared upon our arrival, attending to everyone's safety, providing necessary

care, and handling the bodies of the two deceased," Al Falasi stated.

These eight men were incredibly fortunate that Al Falasi was present and capable enough to conduct the search, rescue, and recovery operations. Had he not been there at that precise moment, the sea would have tragically claimed more lives. The incident reminds people of the ocean's unforgiving nature.

Major General Ahmed Mohammed Rafie, Assistant Commander-in-Chief for Community Happiness and Logistics Affairs at Dubai Police, honoured the courageous Emirati sailor for his swift response. During the honouring, Al Falasi advised individuals planning fishing trips or outings to prioritise safety by adhering to necessary precautions and safety measures to safeguard their lives.

Sailing has entrenched itself in the UAE's culture, facilitating the development of early maritime trade routes in the region. Traditional wooden dhow boats once sailed as far as East Africa. Even though the turquoise waters can be very inviting, sailors, fishermen, divers, or water sports enthusiasts must remember that the calm and welcoming seas can also be treacherous. Whether venturing on the water for sightseeing, relaxation, or fishing, it's always a requisite to always heed authorities' guidelines on the basics of safety at sea.

All maritime vessels need to be registered and the captains or drivers of the vessels must hold a current licence. This applies to large oil tankers and all the way down to small recreational boats.

The rules and regulations are in place and rigorously enforced but there are always those who think they are so clever that the rules do not apply to them.

We've rounded up the top things that must be considered when planning for a sea adventure.

CHECK WEATHER FORECAST

In February 2024, the UAE Coast Guard rescued six crew members whose boat had capsized amidst adverse weather conditions. Promptly locating the distressed wooden vessel, they safely retrieved all crew members, who subsequently

attention and were found to be in good physical health.

Another maritime incident occurred just last month, as a boat carrying an Emirati and three Asians capsized off the Sharjah coast, approximately 17 nautical miles from Hamriyah Port, due to inclement weather. The UAE Coast Guard swiftly intervened, conducting a search and rescue mission that resulted in the retrieval of the four individuals.

Similar to other hazards at sea, rough weather can typically be avoided by checking a weather forecast before departure. However, even the most cautious sailor can be caught off guard by sudden windstorms. Therefore, it's essential to always prepare for the worst and remain vigilant for signs such as telltale clouds and white-capped waves.

Even light winds can transform usually calm seas into choppy waters, causing discomfort and seasickness, particularly for inexperienced sailors. Rough waters, especially for novices, can be daunting and potentially hazardous, especially if panic ensues. Always check the weather forecast before heading out to sea, and be prepared to seek shelter quickly during unexpected storms.

If you're close enough to shore, seek refuge in a safe harbour or the sheltered side of an island where large waves are less likely. Sudden squalls are usually brief and may precede a change in wind direction, often with stronger speeds.

If returning to the harbour seems risky, consider facing the wind and waves with

General tips when sailing in your boat

- Keep a constant lookout for nearby objects and steer clear of commercial vessels in the vicinity.
- Maintain a safe distance between your boat and sailing vessels, and navigate in open areas where large vessel captains have clear visibility of you. You should be at least one nautical mile away from them.
- Avoid anchoring in navigational waterways or channels.
- Note that aluminium boats are challenging to spot during daylight, especially in foggy, cloudy, or poor visibility conditions.
- Always wear clothing that is visible after sunset and in low visibility conditions.
- Ensure all correct navigational lights are switched on.
- Ensure navigational lights are in good working order to indicate your boat type, length, and direction to others.

your bow, maintaining enough speed to steer without going too fast. Without power, a vessel may drift sideways, making it prone to capsizing. Using a sea anchor or tying a strong bucket to the bows can help keep your vessel facing the waves if the engine fails.

KEEP CLEAR OF BIG SHIPS

The waters of the UAE are bustling commercial shipping lanes for large cargo ships, and oil, and gas tankers. Small boats must always steer clear of these large vessels for their own safety. Usually, due to the height of the bridge and the size of the vessels, it can be very difficult for the crew members on watch to see any small boats close by. Additionally, these ships are not very manoeuvrable and can take a great distance to stop or effectively change course.

One such incident involving a large cargo vessel occurred last February 2024. During a late-night operation, Dubai Police rescued eight fishermen after their boat collided with a large cargo ship. The search and rescue operation was carried out by the Ports Police Station and Air Wing Centre. The fishing boat was heavily damaged, and three crew members were injured.

Brigadier Dr Hassan Suhail Al Suwaidi, Director of the Ports Police Station at Dubai Police, stated that the incident happened "late at night" when a large cargo vessel collided with a fishing boat heading towards Dubai's fish market. "The impact forced the boat to drift two nautical miles before the cargo ship stopped, causing the fishing vessel to break apart. Three of the eight fishermen onboard sustained various injuries and were promptly transported by the Dubai Police Air Wing to Rashid Hospital, while marine rescue teams rescued the remaining five sailors," he added. "The cargo ship, due to

its massive size, could not enter the port. Our marine rescue boats swiftly evacuated the sailors from the vessel and transferred them to the station despite challenging weather conditions and high waves caused by strong winds."

Al Suwaidi encouraged ship and boat captains to register for the 'Sail Safely' service available on the Dubai Police app. This feature allows them to input their

vovage plan and expected destinations. facilitating emergency assistance and location tracking if needed. The service includes an SOS button for immediate distress signals.

The key safety guidelines for small boats around large ships include maintaining a safe distance, avoiding crossing ahead or close astern of big ships, and always keeping to the starboard side of a channel. It's crucial not to impede the passage of large ships in a channel and to maintain a vigilant lookout at all times. Small boat operators should communicate their intentions clearly to approaching large ships at least one mile in advance and refrain from anchoring in the navigation channel to ensure safe navigation for all vessels involved.

UNDERGO PROPER TRAINING

Sailing involves both science and technical know-how. For instance, to safely sail, one must be very familiar with a system of buoys, poles, and lights assists. Each type of mark has a unique combination of colour, shape, top mark, and light for safe navigation.

For people who intend to captain a vessel, ensure you have the required licences and qualifications for the type and size of the boat. Now if you are chartering a boat with its crew, ensure they are properly licensed and qualified. Always use credible companies, verify their documentation, and check reviews and

references from their previous clients. If you suspect someone is operating illegally, report them to the authorities. By doing so, you are helping to protect others from being scammed and potentially facing lifethreatening situations.

In the UAE, numerous private maritime training schools and centres provide extensive training for acquiring maritime driving licences.

IS YOUR BOAT SEAWORTHY?

It's crucial to ensure that the boat you board is seaworthy. While this may seem like common sense, many boats at sea are not adequately maintained and could pose a safety risk.

In the UAE, all registered vessels must adhere to strict regulations to ensure their safety and seaworthiness. Therefore, it's important to always use credible tour companies, yacht charters, or fishing

boat services. Opting for unofficial or potentially illegal services to save money could endanger your life. Remember, like cars, boats are machines, and even well-maintained ones can experience problems.

While at sea, whether on a tour or a fishing trip, if you notice anything amiss with the boat, report it to the captain or crew immediately. They can assess the situation and take any necessary safety measures or provide you with an explanation.

CHART YOUR COURSE

Always familiarise yourself with the planned route, destinations, and estimated arrival times for your journey. Additionally, inform someone who is not travelling with you about your itinerary and arrange regular check-in calls with them. This is a fundamental safety practice for all types of travel. In the event that you go missing or fail to check in, raising the alarm promptly will ensure that rescuers know where to begin their search.

Many captains now use global positioning systems (GPS) for navigation, with some devices equipped with emergency location reporting features. These features enable the automatic alerting of emergency services if the boat encounters any issues. If you frequently travel by boat, investing in a GPS with such capabilities could be a wise decision.



EMERGENCY EQUIPMENT

Even on leisurely evening cruises, take a moment to locate the fire extinguishers upon boarding. They should be marked alongside other emergency items like first aid kits.

Meanwhile, all vessels are required to carry life jackets and emergency rafts suitable for the number of passengers and crew the vessel is licensed to carry. This is a vital check to make before setting sail.

According to Abu Dhabi Maritime regulations, the PFD Type 1 lifejackets is preferred because they provide high buoyancy to keep wearers safely afloat. They are brightly coloured with reflective patches for visibility. It's advisable to have one lifejacket for each person on board the vessel.

Furthermore, boats are required to carry emergency signalling equipment, often in the form of parachute flares, rockets, or smoke signals. These items are usually stored in a marked container, with simple usage instructions provided. In the event of an emergency, flares and smoke signals can alert nearby vessels to your distress and help rescuers locate your position.

STAY CONNECTED

Boats must be equipped with radios for communication with other vessels, authorities, and emergency services. While mobile phones can pick up signals close to shore, coverage may be unavailable in deeper waters or remote areas. It's advisable to check with your captain regarding the vessel's communication capabilities and potential dead spots for mobile phone coverage.

ABANDONING VESSEL SAFELY

In a dire emergency necessitating abandoning a boat or vessel, wear your life jacket securely and take bottled water if available. Once in the water, swim towards rafts, lifeboats, or floating debris. If the vessel remains afloat after capsizing, stay close as it's more visible to rescuers. If the boat sinks, stick together with other survivors for better visibility. Swimming to shore is an option, but beware of strong sea currents. Instead of fighting them, conserve energy and avoid dehydration. Signal rescuers with coloured materials, whistles, or lights attached to life jackets if they're nearby.

Authorities and emergency services stand ready to assist, but prevention is always preferable. Despite the sea's allure, its dangers are real, so remain prepared at all times.

Pre-departure checklists for sailors and yacht owners

Recreational boating should be fun, safe, and hassle-free. Whether you own, rent, or borrow a pleasure craft, ensure it is in good working order and properly equipped before heading out on the water.



Inspect your boat

- Inspect your pleasure craft's hull and check for cracks or other damage.
- If you are operating a power-driven pleasure craft, check its electrical, fuel, propulsion, and cooling systems.
- Ensure the throttle is operating smoothly and is not sticking or binding.
- Check the steering is working properly.
- Check the oil and fuel levels.
- Check all hoses and lines for leaks or cracks and replace them if necessary. Ensure all clamps and belts are secure and in good condition.
- Inspect, clean, and replace spark plugs if necessary.
- Check and change oil and water filters if necessary.
- Check the battery's charge and its fluid levels.
- Ensure the drainage plug is in place.
- Verify the load on your boat is well distributed.



Ensure your boat has what it needs for a safe trip

- Are there enough flotation devices of appropriate size for everyone on board?
- Is all of the required equipment in good working order?
- Do you have ample reserves of fuel for the trip or will you need to refuel? A good rule of thumb for fuel is one-third for the trip out, onethird for the return, and one-third as reserve.
- Do you have maps and charts?



Take a minute to consider your safety preparedness

- Do you have a first aid kit, basic tools, and spare parts?
- Have you checked the weather forecast?
- Are there any local hazards or boating restrictions?
- Have you informed somebody that you are sailing and when do you expect to return?

Unexpected emergencies happen fast. Being ready could save you

Person overboard

A person overboard situation occurs when someone falls from a boat or ship into the water. This can happen due to various reasons such as accidents, rough seas, or unexpected movements of the vessel. When a person goes overboard, it becomes a critical emergency requiring immediate action to ensure the individual's safety and rescue. Time is of the essence in such situations posure to cold water and the risk of drowning are

as exposure to cold water and the risk of drowning are significant concerns.

In case of a person overboard situation, clearly shout "Man overboard" to alert everyone on board; throw any available flotation device to aid the person in the water and mark their position; carefully monitor the person in the water, continuously pointing at them and recording their position if possible; and immediately stop the boat to minimize the distance between the person and the vessel. Be mindful that turning the boat could pose a risk, so ensure the stern is turned away from the person to avoid injury from the propeller.

Drowning



Confidence in swimming can sometimes be dangerous. It's important to swim only when others are nearby to provide help if needed. Even strong swimmers can face accidents that quickly become lifethreatening without assistance. Always ensure a lifeguard is on duty before entering the water. If a swimmer has a medical condition, such as seizures, constant

supervision, and appropriate safety gear are crucial. Those at risk of sudden inability to swim should wear a lifejacket in large bodies of water. Children benefit greatly from swimming lessons, reducing their drowning risk, but supervision should never be reduced based on their swimming ability. Always keep a close eye on children, regardless of their skill level.

Police are cautioning people who go out to sea to pay attention to weather alerts, particularly during this season when conditions can quickly become hazardous. Ignoring these alerts raises the risk of accidents and drowning, especially for weak swimmers or those who underestimate the dangers.

Capsize



Capsizes are common boating accidents often resulting in fatalities, occurring unexpectedly and rapidly. Victims have limited time to access nearby items, with many succumbing before help arrives, especially fishermen. It's crucial to keep lifejackets easily accessible, or better yet, wear them. Understanding how your boat will behave in water is essential, as it affects

equipment retrieval. In case of water ingress, ensure everyone wears a lifejacket, locate and stem the leak, make a distress call, and head towards shallower waters while bailing out water. Stay with the boat if it submerges or overturns, increasing the chances of rescue.

Ultraviolet radiation



Ultraviolet radiation peaks between 11 am and 3 pm during Daylight Saving Time. Boaters are at heightened risk due to reflected radiation from the water. Prevention is vital, with clothing offering the best protection. Cover exposed areas with a wide-brimmed hat, and long-sleeved shirt, and apply sunscreen with SPF 30+ or higher, broad spectrum, and waterresistant properties. Apply sunscreen 20 minutes before exposure and reapply every two hours.

Hypothermia



Hypothermia occurs when in water, leading to unconsciousness and potential drowning.


Wearing a life lacket can prevent

Wearing a life jacket can prevent submersion and offer some defence against hypothermia while conserving energy. Despite feeling warmer when treading water, it's a deceptive sensation; energy should be conserved for warmth maintenance rather than movement. Heat loss

is faster in water than in air of the same temperature. If in the water with floating objects like an upturned jet ski or boat, raise as much of your torso out of the water as possible and gather in a 'huddle' position with others for body heat conservation and support.



POLICING NOISE

AE citizens and residents have a strong affinity for cars, even with the availability of highend public transport. Within this car culture, some drivers modify their vehicle engines to emit excessive noise, disturbing the peace of schools, mosques, and residential areas through loud engines.

Recently, Abu Dhabi Police released an educational video, issuing a warning against excessive noise through vehicular modifications. They reminded motorists to avoid honking, abrupt accelerations, speeding, and noisy driving behaviours. Such actions, as per the police, not only inconvenience citizens and residents but also negatively affect the well-being of vulnerable groups including children, the sick, and the elderly, leading to heightened anxiety and discomfort.

Interestingly, Abu Dhabi Police developed the world's first traffic noise radar technology in 2016, designed

to target and penalise drivers of loud vehicles. Equipped with a sound level metre and an advanced camera, this system effectively identifies drivers causing noise pollution.

Last month, Sharjah Police announced that noise radars installed on the streets had detected 628 loud vehicles in 2023, most of which had illegally modified engines. Captain Saud Al Shaiba, Director of the Awareness and Information Branch at the Traffic and Patrols Department at Sharjah Police, stated, "Modifications of vehicles cause great disturbance to residents and also pose a safety hazard when motorists drive recklessly."

Car manufacturers generally comply with regulations designed to ensure vehicles do not inherently produce excessive noise. However, aftermarket modifications aimed at enhancing a vehicle's speed or performance can result in increased noise.

In the UAE, hefty fines of Dhs2,000

and 12 black traffic points, with a second offence risking license suspension, act as a deterrent against driving loud vehicles. Playing loud music inside vehicles is also classified as a noise pollution offence, attracting a fine of up to Dhs400 and 4 black points.

PROACTIVE POLICING

Brigadier Juma Salem bin Suwaidan, Acting Director of the General Directorate of Traffic at Dubai Police, has affirmed their year-round commitment to rigorous enforcement against noisy vehicles.

This ongoing vigilance resulted in 230 drivers being penalised for causing noise pollution in the first quarter of 2023 alone. Additionally, 250 vehicles were seized, and fines were levied against 327 drivers for illegal engine modifications.

In 2022, a staggering 4,533 vehicles were booked for illegal modifications in Dubai, including the installation of power boosters to augment speed. Of this figure, 2,300 vehicles were seized for causing noise disturbances, underscoring the direct correlation between unauthorised engine modifications and the prevalence of loud vehicles.


In Abu Dhabi, the police have warned that installation of superchargers and turbochargers without proper safety protocols can lead to engine failures and elevate the risk of fire hazards. Moreover, drivers of vehicles causing excessive noise due to altered power boosters or silencers face penalties of up to Dhs2,000 and 12 black points on their licence.

In adherence to Law No. (5) of 2020 in Abu Dhabi, owners of vehicles impounded due to illegal modifications are subject to a release fee of Dhs10,000. Failure to pay this fee within three months places the impounded vehicle at risk of auction.


THIS MONTH IN HISTORY: World's first traffic noise radar

Seven years ago, in April 2016, Abu Dhabi Police introduced the world's first modified speed radar equipped with a sensor to function as a noise radar. This innovation aims to reduce vehicle noises that exceed legal limits, aiming to bring tranquillity to residential areas, hospitals, mosques, and schools. It is particularly designed to deter the

disturbance caused by noisy motorbikes racing at night. The system comprises two integral components: a sound intensity sensor and an advanced camera capable of capturing digital images of offending vehicles. It operates by measuring the noise level of each passing vehicle. Should the noise exceed the predetermined threshold, the radar automatically captures the vehicle's image, scans its licence plate, and issues a fine to the driver for the noise violation.







Penalty for driving a noisy vehicle

The law: Under Article 20 of the UAE's Federal Traffic Law, noisy vehicles may be impounded for up to 6 months.

Traffic fines: Driving a noisy car incurs a fine of Dhs2,000 along with 12 black traffic points.

Licence suspension:

Accumulating 24 black points can lead to the suspension of a driver's licence, putting drivers at risk of suspension if caught with a noisy vehicle twice.

Vehicle confiscation:

Modifying car engines without adhering to UAE's guidelines results in a fine of Dhs1,000, 12 black points, and vehicle confiscation.





I hope drivers will become more aware of the impact of their noise and show consideration for those seeking peace in such sacred places," he said.

Ayaz Ahmad Qadri, employed at a hypermarket in Dubai, recounted his experience: "While I was in a taxi, an important business call was nearly ruined by the excessive noise from cars driven by a group of youngsters. It made communication with my client almost impossible."

NOISE LIMITS

The continuous buzz of engines and honking horns also compromise the

Health risks of noise

HE hidden dangers of noise pollution have been increasingly emphasised by recent studies. For example, a study published in the *European Journal of Public Health* in August 2023 delves into the adverse health outcomes associated with environmental noise, highlighting that exposure can lead to severe conditions including cardiovascular disease, diabetes, and mental health impacts.

Further insights come from a January 2022 report in Environmental International, which underlines the cognitive toll of noise pollution. It demonstrates how such environmental disturbance can impair cognitive abilities in older adults and detrimentally affect children's reading and language development. The widespread repercussions of these findings are indeed concerning.

Moreover, research presented by the American College of Cardiology in March 2022 establishes a disturbing connection between noise pollution from traffic, trains, and planes and an increased risk of heart attacks. These findings underscore noise pollution as not merely an annoyance but a significant public health hazard. These collective studies reinforce the urgent need for heightened awareness and action against noise pollution, particularly from vehicles, to mitigate its substantial health risks.







disturbances, hearing loss, and other health concerns, impacting both physical and mental health.

The level of sound to which humans are exposed is measured in dB(A), signifying decibels adjusted. Community noise guidelines from the World Health Organization suggest keeping bedrooms below 30 dB(A) during the night for optimal sleep quality and classrooms below 35 dB(A) for effective teaching and learning conditions. Beyond sleeping areas, the World Health Organization recommends night-time noise levels below 40 dB(A); anything louder could negatively impact health.

In the UAE, a Federal Bylaw enacted in 2006 by the Federal Environment Agency establishes noise level limits in residential, commercial, and industrial zones, ranging from 30 to 70 dB(A), with varying thresholds for day and night (see accompanying box). However, the average noise produced by cars travelling at speeds of 80-100 km/h can reach as high as 65-70 dB(A), with modified vehicles exacerbating the issue further. Municipalities have established noise regulations. For example, according to Dubai Municipality guidelines, noise from construction or demolition activities must not surpass 55 dB(A) between 7am and 8pm, and 45 dB(A) between 8pm and 7am.

Three stages of action



Decibel limit:

Across the UAE, there's a general decibel limit of 95 for vehicle noise. Exceeding this leads to penalties.



Vehicle detection:

Radars installed on roads detect vehicles exceeding the noise limit.



Fine enforcement:

Radars record the number plates of noisy vehicles for fine



AWARENESS DRIVES

Abu Dhabi Police regularly conduct campaigns aimed at addressing the issue of noise pollution and the dangers posed by illegally modified vehicles, with a special focus on areas like sandy areas and family campgrounds. The police encourage the community to play a proactive role by reporting such disturbances through the 999 hotline.

The overarching goal of these campaigns is to strike a balance between ensuring road safety and enhancing the quality of life for residents, illustrating the





UAE's holistic strategy in managing traffic and promoting public health.

In Dubai, Brigadier bin Suwaidan underscored the importance of parental responsibility and community involvement in upholding road safety standards. "Parents must supervise their children and prevent irresponsible vehicle use. The public can help by reporting modified vehicles through the 'We Are All Police' app or by calling 901. Modifying cars for increased speed has led to serious accidents," bin Suwaidan told the media.

LATE-NIGHT DISTURBANCE

In the lull of authority, thrill-seekers take flight. This is the mindset embraced by

many stunt drivers, often youngsters, who frequent the tranquil streets to perform perilous stunts with their vehicles' engines thundering. However, this notion isn't applicable in the UAE, as the police are ever-vigilant, especially more so at night. They monitor every nook and cranny of the streets through CCTV cameras round the clock.

Bin Suwaidan remarked, "We target motorcyclists congregating after midnight, exceeding speed and noise limits, with fines and vehicle impoundment."

For most of Dubai, the permitted noise level between 7am to 8pm is 40-50 decibels, while at night, acceptable decibel levels are 30-

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

40, which is the typical level of a suburban area at night.

ADHERE TO RULES

The UAE authorities implore car enthusiasts to adhere to stringent regulations when personalising their vehicles. Prohibited modifications encompass electrical alterations, nitrogen pipe installations, exhaust enhancements, and the addition of powerful speakers.

While engine upgrades aim to increase power, they could compromise safety if not properly executed.

Effectively addressing vehicle noise pollution necessitates a collaborative approach. Government agencies, communities, and stakeholders must unite to address the issue comprehensively. Such collaboration strives to secure a quieter and more enjoyable living environment for all.



The precautionary principle:

Noise should always be minimised to the lowest feasible level in any given context. Should there be a reasonable likelihood of public health being adversely affected, measures must be undertaken to safeguard public health without waiting for complete scientific verification.

The polluter pays principle:

The entire costs related to noise pollution—including its monitoring, management, reduction, and oversight—ought to be borne by the entities responsible for generating the noise.

The prevention principle:

Efforts should be made to mitigate noise at its source wherever feasible. Land-use planning ought to be informed by an environmental health impact assessment that evaluates the implications of noise alongside other pollutants, ensuring a comprehensive approach to public health and environmental protection.





Dodgy recruitment, costly mistake

BEWARE OF HIRING UNDOCUMENTED HOUSEHOLD HELP. IN DUBAI, 90 PER CENT OF BURGLARY CASES ARE LINKED TO EMPLOYING ILLEGAL WORKERS. 999 EXPLAINS THE RIGHT PROCEDURES FOR HIRING A MAID

ndocumented labour operates outside the legal framework, often controlled by criminal organisations that smuggle them into the country, exploit their earnings, and sometimes involve them in illegal activities. Would you risk hiring someone without proper documentation or background checks? Doing so increases the likelihood of becoming a victim of home burglaries, with 90 per cent attributed to hiring illegal workers in Dubai. Think twice before entrusting your property or children to illegally hired individuals.

The UAE has established Tadbeer centres to regulate domestic help recruitment, ensuring the protection of both employers and employees. These centres, overseen by the Ministry of Human Resources and Emiratisation

(MoHRE), manage recruitment agencies providing household service workers with visas, orientation, and training. However, illegal recruitment entities bypass these regulations, offering no legal protection or support, undermining the country's efforts to provide services within regulatory frameworks.

Recently, the MoHRE has taken legal action against 55 entities and shut down 5 social media accounts for engaging in illegal recruitment and mediation activities without obtaining the required permits from the Ministry. The violators were facing up to not less than a year's jail time and hefty fines ranging from Dhs40,000 to Dhs200,000.

Runaway maids in Ramadan

Ramadan is a period when police often encounter numerous cases of maids violating labour laws by absconding from their sponsors. They engage in part-time work, using false identities and documents, for other families to earn extra income quickly. Brigadier Ali Salem Al Shamsi, Director of the Suspects and Criminal Phenomena Department at Dubai Police, emphasised, "We intensify our efforts during Ramadan as runaway maids pose a security threat. People are urged not to employ absconding domestic helpers and to report them to the police. This would contribute to safeguarding the community's security."

Al Khoury added, "The Ministry carries out inspection visits to suspected companies to flag unlawful practices and refer cases of violation to the Public Prosecution."

The Ministry's inspection systems monitor promotional and advertising campaigns circulated on social media or any other platforms to identify potential violations in the job market. The risk of hiring or being hired as an undocumented worker couldn't just result in financial loss; it could be something far more serious than that.

EMPLOYERS, FOCUS ON SAFETY

There are two primary reasons why security forces and other government

authorities closely monitor workers – to prevent their exploitation by rogue recruiters and to protect employers from potential criminal elements amongst them.

According to the police, many employers fail to consider whether the individuals they hire, who often have access to children and valuable possessions, have a criminal history. Major General Jamal Salem Al Jallaf, Director of the General Department of Criminal Investigations at Dubai Police, emphasised the severity of the situation in April last year, urging homeowners and business owners to refrain from hiring undocumented workers. Al Jallaf stated, "We have found that 90 per cent of all burglaries in homes in Dubai were due to hiring illegal workers. It is alarming that homeowners entrust their property to these illegal workers while they are away on vacation."

Meanwhile, Colonel Adel Al Joker, Assistant General Director for Search and Investigation Affairs at the General Department of Criminal Investigations at Dubai Police, stated, "It is quite common for illegal domestic workers to collude with burglars. We have found many cases where an illegal worker has either provided a copy of the villa keys to a burglar or shared details about the entrance and the layout of the house."

Al Jallaf added that anyone found guilty of employing illegal workers could face a fine of up to Dhs50,000. This penalty is stipulated in the updated law governing the employment of house help.

MOHRE stated that the amended law, Federal Decree Law No. 9 of 2022 Concerning Domestic Workers, aims to "build on the UAE's achievements in supporting domestic workers... in a way that is aligned with the best international practices". The Ministry highlighted that the law ensures the fulfilment of both parties' aspirations, reduces labour disputes.

THEFT CASES

The most common risk in such employment arrangements is theft. If the maid isn't registered anywhere, it becomes much more difficult to trace her and recover stolen items. However, if she is registered, the police can track her down even years after the crime.

In Dubai, an employer fell victim to theft by her domestic help. His wife informed him about the missing items, which included a laptop, tablet, watches, and





jewellery. The other household workers denied any knowledge of the theft. Since the maid in question was on vacation, her room was searched, revealing three boxes prepared for shipping. It turned out that she had hid the missing valuable items in these boxes. Accordingly, she had asked the other household workers to ship the boxes to her home country before flying home.

Upon her return to the country, the maid was arrested and interrogated. She denied the theft, alleging that the employer's wife and daughter had given her the items as gifts. The Criminal Court found the maid guilty of theft and sentenced her to six months in prison, along with a fine of Dhs2,000 and deportation. The Dubai Court of Appeal upheld the decision.

ESCAPING EXPLOITATION

Meanwhile, unregistered maids are also on the losing end because they become vulnerable to unfair employment and mistreatment.

In one such case, a 15-year-old girl was lured to work in the UAE under false pretences but ended up being held captive and forced into illicit activities. Dubai authorities rescued her and prosecuted six individuals involved. The Dubai Court of Appeal increased the sentences for four of them from 7 to 10 years and for the other two from 3 to 7 years.

In another instance, two Asian nationals, Rem and Rachelle (name withheld), had been working in Ajman as household service help for several years. When they were sent outside for chores, they were approached a 38-year-old man and a 36-year-old woman, who promised to hire them instead.

Rem and Rachelle absconded from their original employers, with high hopes that their life would take a turn for the better. What they didn't expect was that they were getting lured into a deeper trap of prostitution.

They found themselves locked up in an apartment in Ajman by the woman who had promised to get them jobs as company cleaners. The deceitful woman told them that they'd have to work as prostitutes because there were no other jobs just then.

By February 2022, the two imprisoned women hatched a plan to escape by tying up bedsheets together and climbing



How to hire household help legalty in the UAE

Here are the four packages offered by Tadbeer centres for employers seeking to hire household help:



Direct sponsorship package

Tadbeer centres, in this package, recruit domestic help from outside the UAE and guarantee their performance and lovalty for 180 days, while their visas are sponsored directly by the employing family.



Direct sponsorship after 6 months

This package allows families to hire a temporary worker for six months, after which the domestic worker's visa can be transferred under family sponsorship, if both parties agree.



Tadbeer sponsorship

The third package includes the option of hiring workers through the Tadbeer centre's sponsorship.



Time-based packages

This package offers ondemand services that allow families to hire household help through the sponsorship of Tadbeer centres, in order to provide flexible services based on the needs of the customers.

Important: MoHRE regularly updates the list of authorised centres for domestic services on its website.

down the building's outer wall. In doing so, Rem broke her pelvis and lost a lot of blood, while Rachelle suffered a fall with minor injuries.

Neighbours rushed the injured women to the hospital, and the two racketeers who had trapped them were arrested by Ajman Police.

According to investigations, the accused enticed victims by offering them jobs and helping them to abscond from their legal sponsors. They made the same promise of a "cleaning job" to all their victims. But just like what happened to Rem and Rachelle, the victims were locked up in an apartment.

LICENSING REQUIREMENTS AND OBLIGATIONS

Article 4 outlines licensing requirements for Domestic Workers Recruitment Offices, emphasising the need for Ministry of Human Resources and Emiratisation (MoHRE) approval.

The law prohibits recruiting workers under 18 and specifies prohibited acts during recruitment.

Articles 6 and 7 authorise a formal contract, approved by MoHRE, covering worker requirements, rights and obligations, financial obligations, and the recruitment process timeframe.

Recruitment offices must inform workers about job details, refrain from charging commissions, conduct pre-employment medical examinations, and provide suitable accommodation.

RESCISSION OF CONTRACT

Article 20 of the Federal Decree-Law No. 9/2022 allows either party to unilaterally rescind the employment contract for specified breaches.

If the employer terminates the contract without attributing reasons, they must provide a return ticket and settle outstanding entitlements. The Domestic Workers

If the domestic worker ends the contract post-probation period, reasons attributed to them incur varying obligations based on the recruitment method.

INSPECTION AND PENALTIES

Article 24 authorises Ministry employees to monitor and inspect various aspects related to domestic workers.

Article 25 establishes administrative penalties for violations, outlined in the Implementing Regulation.

UAE courts' jurisdiction to examine disputes arising from violations, with a 3-month timeframe for filing lawsuits.

Penalties outlined in Article 27 range from fines of Dhs5,000 to Dhs1,000,000 for various violations, including incorrect information provision, employment of unlicensed workers, and exploitation of electronic systems.

Imprisonment of up to 6 months and fines up to Dhs100,000 are applicable for obstructing authorities and revealing work secrets.



CLAMPDOWN ON ROGUE RECRUITERS

In 2023, MoHRE blocked 153 individuals who were allowing their domestic help to take on additional employment, a violation of UAE law. Strict penalties are imposed on those who flout this rule.

The 153 employers could potentially face fines of up to Dhs50,000, with cases referred to the Public Prosecution and their files blocked from obtaining fresh worker permits. These actions align with Federal Decree-Law No. 9 of 2022 and its executive regulations, which prohibit unauthorised employment of domestic workers or allow them to work elsewhere without meeting requirements.

MoHRE stated, "This is an explicit violation of legislations and poses health and social risks to employers and their families." It added, "We call on employers to deal exclusively with licensed domestic worker recruitment agencies, which can be found listed on the MoHRE's official website and social media pages."

BENEFITS OF LEGAL EMPLOYMENT

Hiring through authorised agencies ensures worker rights protection. Before departing their home country, workers are briefed on contract terms, including entitlements like weekly rest and 30 days paid annual leave. Recruitment agencies are legally prohibited from charging commissions or engaging in discrimination.

Legal hiring provides recourse under the law for employers in case of criminal activities, avoiding potential legal issues. Employers often refrain from reporting crimes involving undocumented labour to evade penalties.

By bypassing authorised channels, employers lack means to authenticate worker information, increasing risks. Unauthorised hiring may lead to untrained workers with no guarantees of service quality, risking family health with potential infectious diseases.

SAFETY AND WELFARE

On one hand, having an efficient domestic helper brings peace of mind to employers. Recognised as essential contributors to a household, especially for working parents, most employers acknowledge that the right domestic help offers more than just an extra pair of hands.

On the other hand, for domestic helpers, securing a job in the UAE represents a transformative opportunity

to improve their lives. It enables them to settle old debts, access better healthcare, and aspire to greater ambitions.

This holds particularly true for domestic helpers who view the UAE as a gateway to escape the cycle of poverty and achieve greater educational and professional success for their children or family members.

Hence, both employers and domestic helpers must comply with the law, as it solely aims to safeguard their welfare and safety.

She fosters Maryam's development by encouraging her to develop new hobbies and interacting with people. Currently, Maryam enjoys swimming and actively participates in a swimming club.

Neurodevelopmental conditions, along with psychological and mental health

issues, amongst children are recognised as one of the most pressing health challenges confronting Arab communities today. These psychological and mental health issue arise amidst various social, cultural, and economic factors impacting children's health and psychological well-being.

Addressing these challenges in Arab children necessitates collective efforts from families, schools, governments, and healthcare institutions. By raising awareness, offering social support, and improving early detection services, we can foster a healthier environment for children and promote their well-rounded growth and development.

TOUGH CHILDHOOD

Dr Khalifa Mohammed Al Magbali, a consulting psychiatrist at Sheikh Shakhbout Medical City in Abu Dhabi, stresses the crucial role parents play in their children's upbringing and relationships.

challenges, underscoring the vital role of family dynamics," says Dr Al Magbali.

Behavioural patterns, habits, and experiences deeply impact personality and holistic development. Abnormal psychology, which refers to the study of atypical or unusual behaviours and mental illnesses, helps identify the roots of childhood psychological and mental health conditions.

Dr Al Magbali stresses, "The cornerstone of mental health lies in individuals growing up within nurturing environments where they can fulfil their needs for security, love, appreciation, and self-actualisation, fostering feelings of competence, happiness, and security throughout life."

"Individuals who experience persistent rejection, cruelty, dominance, and violence are susceptible to mental health conditions. Violence exerts a negative impact on mental health, particularly when experienced repeatedly. Hence, it is imperative to identify and address issues and factors influencing the early stage of development," adds Dr Al Maqbali.

SOCIAL INTERACTION

Prof Rasha Abdel Hamid Sadek, from Kalbaa University in Sharjah, stresses the importance of families adapting to a member with issues and factors influencing the early stage of development.

"Such conditions affect individuals within families like any other illness," she states. "Therefore, family members need awareness and guidance on how to interact with them."

She adds, "Creating unity, support, and assistance during this phase is crucial until the patient recovers. Unfortunately, some families face social stigma due to negative perceptions about these conditions, leading them to isolate the patient and avoid seeking specialised medical care."

Prof Sadek emphasises that early detection is key to determine tailored therapeutic interventions, be it cognitive, behavioural, or chemical therapies. She highlights how certain customs and traditions influence parental perceptions, contributing to fear of community judgment. Promoting societal awareness and education is essential for fostering acceptance and integration into society effectively.


OVERUSE OF DIGITAL MEDIA

Children and teens today are surrounded by digital media. This includes TV, videos, social media, video games, and more, all available on devices like computers, e-readers, gaming consoles, smartphones, and other screens.

However, the impact of media on the cognitive and emotional development of children and adolescents is profound, shaping their feelings, cognition, and behaviour. Understanding the nuanced interplay between digital media usage and its potential ramifications is important for families.

Overuse of digital media poses risks for children, including delays in learning and social skills due to reduced interaction with people. Exposure to violent content can lead to behaviour problems, as

Anxiety disorders: Children experience outsized fears or worries that disrupt their ability to engage in activities like play, school, or social interactions. This may include social anxiety, generalised anxiety, and obsessive-compulsive disorders.

Attention-deficit/ hyperactivity disorder

(ADHD): Children with ADHD struggle with paying attention, impulsivity, hyperactivity, or a combination of these issues compared to their peers.

Autism: A neurological condition, autism manifests in early childhood, affecting communication and social interaction abilities to varying degrees.

Eating disorders:

Characterised by an unhealthy fixation on body image, distorted thoughts about weight, and harmful eating habits, eating disorders like anorexia nervosa, bulimia nervosa. and binge-eating disorder can lead to emotional, social, and life-threatening physical complications.

Depression and other

mood disorders: Lasting feelings of sadness, irritability, and loss of interest in activities hinder academic performance and social interaction. Bipolar disorder involves extreme mood swings between depression and manic episodes, potentially leading to risky behaviour.

Post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD): Children may experience long-term emotional distress, nightmares, and behavioural issues following exposure to trauma such as violence or abuse.

Schizophrenia: Onset typically occurs in the late teens or early 20s, causing perceptual distortions, hallucinations, and unusual thoughts and behaviours as individuals lose touch with reality.

children may be scared or attempt to mimic what they see. Teens may display risky behaviours on social media, such as substance use or self-injury, influenced by what they see online. Cyberbullying is also a concern, with both short- and long-term negative impacts on victims and bullies.

Prof Sadek highlights the importance of responsible use of technology and social media, recognising their potential to benefit or harm children and teenagers. She shares with 999, "During early childhood, children need nurturing, attention, and support to develop linguistic, social, and behavioural skills effectively within the family. Failure to receive attention or interest from parents may lead children or teenagers to seek solace in social media or technology, including electronic games, resulting in complete detachment from their surroundings and hindering the development of essential skills."

Numerous studies show that excessive social media use increases depression, anxiety, stress, and mental disorders. Therefore, families must monitor their children's behaviours, guide their interaction with technology, and educate them to invest in positive activities that foster skill development and help fulfil their responsibilities, amongst other aspects.

PROMOTING MENTAL HEALTH

Fatima Ali Al Zanhani, a social worker at Al Mazdalifa School in Abu Dhabi, highlights the crucial role of the education system in impacting students' mental health, especially concerning inclusion.

She encourages schools to offer

personalised support to students based on their specific needs and psychological requirements. This involves providing appropriate learning resources, employing special education teachers, and implementing psychological and social support programmes.

"Schools can promote positive social interaction amongst students through cooperative activities and encouraging social communication. Teachers must have continuous training in addressing the needs of students with psychological or mental health conditions, fostering a conducive classroom environment and positive learning experiences," says Al Zanhani

"It's vital to raise awareness amongst school staff about mental health issues and provide support and understanding to students, thus reducing the risk of discrimination, fostering social integration, and alleviating fear and apprehension," adds Al Zanhani.

BALANCE ATTENTION

Psychologists and experts agree that creating a flexible learning environment allows students with psychological or mental health conditions to adapt to their educational needs. This includes special arrangements, extra time for tasks, and integrating technology for enhanced learning processes.

Balancing attention to both mental health and education is crucial, as they are interconnected. In general, psychologists affirm that students' mental well-being affects their ability to learn and participate actively. Poor mental health can hinder educational progress, underscoring the importance of providing psychological and social support alongside educational assistance.







Their exit was swift. the loot in tow, but their operation was anything but smooth. Dev took the wheel. but an unexpected twist of events unfolded. A sudden curb in the darkness caused their getaway car to crash into a lamppost.

They hijacked a taxi, but the ever-watchful police in the emirate were everywhere. During a routine patrol, they were stopped, and when officers came near them, the group attempted to flee.

Captured and handcuffed, four of them immediately felt the heavy consequences of their actions. At a police station, confessions spill forth—a mix of quilt and desperation. Bakar, the elusive fifth member, was hunted down and his hopes of escape were shattered by surveillance cameras and border controls.

They were all referred to public prosecution. In the cold light of justice, the group was sentenced to prison time, to be followed by deportation.





THE 'MELISSA VIRUS'

WHEN: MARCH 1999

WHERE: NEW JERSEY, USA

Two decades ago, the concept of computer viruses was still quite new to many. But one event changed that significantly. It all started in late March 1999 when a man named David Lee Smith took over an America Online (AOL) account and began sending a mass-mailing macro virus. Later named the 'Melissa Virus', it was distributed as an email attachment that, when opened, disabled several safeguards in Word 97 and Word 2000.

This virus caused havoc on March 26. The emails had enticing titles, tricking even more people into opening the virus. It wasn't aimed at stealing money or information, but it still paralysed business operations. Over 300 companies and government bodies were affected, with email systems crashing and the web slowing down. The cleanup cost about \$80 million.

Catching Smith didn't take long. With help from AOL and tight cooperation between the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and New Jersey law enforcement, they apprehended him in early April 1999. He admitted to his crimes and was sentenced to 20 months in jail with a \$5,000 (Dhs18,350) fine in May 2002.

The Melissa Virus was a major wake-up call about the dangers

lurking online. It demonstrated how easily viruses could spread and the extent of damage they could cause.

Following this, the FBI realised the need to enhance its approach to dealing with online threats. Not long after Smith's sentencing, they established a new Cyber Division, focused on combating cybercrime. Twenty years on, with our lives even more intertwined with the internet, this mission is more crucial than ever

THE 'MORRIS WORM'

WHEN: NOVEMBER 1988

WHERE: MASSACHUSETTS, USA

In November 1988, the online world faced an unprecedented threat. A computer at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) became the launchpad for a cyber worm, later called the 'Morris Worm', that quickly began to spread on the Internet and crippled computer networks, which were becoming a vital system for many businesses in the United States and Europe at that time. This worm, a self-replicating program, didn't need a host to spread; it leapt from computer to computer.

It was considered the first computer worm on the Internet. And in just a day after it was unleashed, an estimated 6,000 computers were hit. This was a significant blow, given only about 60,000 computers were online at the time. Prestigious universities and top research centres felt the sting. The worm targeted systems running a specific Unix version, exploiting weaknesses with cunning precision. It didn't delete files, but it slowed vital operations to a crawl and jammed email services for days.

The worm's creator was Robert Tappan Morris, a young genius from Cornell University. Morris had unleashed the worm as an experiment, not anticipating the chaos it would cause. As the digital community scrambled for solutions, Morris's identity quickly surfaced, thanks to a friend's anonymous tip to The New York Times.

Morris became the first person convicted under the Computer Fraud and Abuse Act of 1986. Avoiding jail, he faced a fine, probation, and community service. This

event marked a turning point, highlighting the Internet's vulnerabilities and the need for robust cybersecurity measures. In response, the first computer emergency response team was formed, setting the stage for future defences against digital threats.

THE NASA CYBERATTACK

WHEN: AUGUST 1999

WHERE: FLORIDA, UNITED STATES

Jonathan Joseph James, a notorious young hacker from Miami, Florida, became the first juvenile in the United States to gain significant media attention for his hacking activities. Between August and October 1999, James illegally accessed systems of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's (NASA) Marshall Space Flight Center and the systems of the Defense Threat Reduction Agency (DTRA) of the Department of Defense (DoD), marking a high-profile series of cybersecurity breaches.

At just 15, he exploited a vulnerability in a government server, intercepting thousands of messages and accessing critical software source code for the International Space Station's lifesupport modules. This breach led to a significant security overhaul at NASA, incurring a \$40,000 (Dhs146,800) investigation cost.

Arrested in 2000 shortly after turning 16, James was sentenced to house arrest and probation due to his cooperation with authorities and minor status. Later, he faced a juvenile detention period for violating probation. In 2008, amidst investigations into another hacking incident, James denied involvement but tragically

ended his life, stating through a suicide note his desire to "regain control" over his situation. He died at the age of 24.


IE MOVEIT GYBERATTACK **MAY 2023** WORLDWIDE

The digital world witnessed a surge in cyber threats in May 2023 when a ransomware gang, Clop, exploited a vulnerability in the MOVEit Transfer tool. This zero-day exploit allowed Clop to infiltrate a range of organisations worldwide, causing widespread data breaches.


The scale of the attack was alarming, with over 2,000 organisations reporting incidents and the data of more than 62 million individuals compromised. The victims included high-profile entities like New York City's public schools, a UK-based HR and payroll company servicing giants like British Airways and BBC, and many more. In a particularly concerning case, BORN Ontario disclosed that sensitive data about newborns and pregnant patients, spanning over a decade, had been stolen, affecting around 3.4 million people.

The company behind the file-transfer app, Progress Software, acted swiftly, issuing patches on 9th June and 15th June to address additional vulnerabilities. The aftermath of these attacks saw a flurry of legal actions. Class action lawsuits were filed against IBM, Prudential Financial, Progress Software, and others. These incidents have led to stricter regulations from the Securities and Exchange Commission of the US, demanding timely disclosures from public companies following cybersecurity breaches.

Amongst the affected, Sony Interactive Entertainment sent out notices to about 6,800 individuals, current and former employees, alerting them of a data breach in May 2023. A subsequent breach in September added to their woes.

e've left our previous discussion in the previous issue with the group of lbn Fadlan's journey to the town of Bolghar, the capital of the Saqaliba, located approximately 600 miles east of Moscow in what was then the central region of Russia. The Saqaliba were Slavic people whose territory eventually became part of the Russian Empire.

The group's travel from Jurjan took 70 days. In the city, they were welcomed by four princes related to the king. The king himself greeted them outside the city, expressing gratitude for their safe arrival, providing them with money, and arranging

their accommodation.

During their stay, they spent the initial days settling in. After a few days, the Saqaliba king convened his officials to receive a message from Abbasid Caliph al-Muktadir. To honour the occasion, black Abbasid flags were displayed, and a black horse, with its head covered in black cloth, was prepared for Ibn Fadlan, who dismounted as a gesture of respect. The king, in turn, stood to greet him, marking the formal reception.

Subsequently, the king hosted a meal for the visitors, during which the king directed them to sit on his left side, with his sons sitting close to him.

In Ibn Fadlan's account of his initial encounter with the king of the Sagaliba,

an unexpected complication arose. The king had been promised a certain sum of money by the Caliph, as detailed in a letter. However, the promised money did not arrive as expected, prompting the king to seek clarification from Ibn Fadlan, whom he had tasked with translating the Caliph's letter

Ibn Fadlan explained that due to unforeseen circumstances, they had been unable to secure the funds before their departure. They had hoped the money would be forwarded to them en route, but did not become possible.

The king voiced his disappointment, highlighting the significant efforts and resources that had been allocated to support their journey. Additionally, he mentioned the planned construction of a fortress, intended to protect them against Jews who had previously enslaved him. This critical defensive project was now under threat of delay or cancellation, according to the king.

The situation left Ibn Fadlan troubled and disheartened as he exited the king's court. Despite this, the king seemed to disregard the looming issues, instead



choosing to foster a closer relationship with Ibn Fadlan while distancing himself from the rest of the group.

Following this tense interaction, Ibn Fadlan offered insights into the social dynamics within the kingdom of the Sagaliba, providing a detailed narrative of the kingdom and its inhabitants. He said, "In that land, I witnessed marvels too numerous to detail. Upon our initial evening, as the sun dipped below the horizon, the sky transformed into a deep red hue, accompanied by formidable sounds. Shortly afterwards, the sky adopted a fiery red appearance once more. Lifting my gaze, I observed what seemed to be a flaming cloud close by, the source of the thunderous noises.

"My companions and I, overtaken by panic, turned to prayer, while the local inhabitants observed our fear with amusement and wonder. Curious about this spectacle, I sought an explanation from the king. He informed me that what we had witnessed was a battle amongst the jinn, a clash between those who were believers and the non-believers amongst

The stars were scarcely visible, appearing to me as if they were the 15 wandering planets. Unlike its



usual course, the moon did not ascend to the zenith but skirted the horizon briefly before vanishing at dawn. Upon sunrise, the land and mountains were bathed in red, casting all in sight as if enveloped by a vast cloud. This crimson hue lingered until darkness falls. With the arrival of winter, the nights once again extended, and the days shortened.

"During my travels, I observed their

joy at the howling of dogs, which they interpreted as an omen of a prosperous and blessed year. Numerous deer were spotted, with even large groups assembling on single tree branches, yet they were neither harmed nor killed. I encountered an immense tree, exceeding a hundred arms in length, lying fallen. Approaching it, I saw a snake nearly as long as the tree itself, which vanished



shortly after being seen. The king, in the presence of his courtiers, assured me, 'Do not be alarmed, for it poses no threat.'

"The consumption of exceptionally green and sour apples by the servants caught my eye. In their lands, hazelnut trees were abundant, cultivated on farms spanning forty farsakhs. Their meals primarily consisted of meat, wheat, and barley. Agricultural produce remained the sole property of the farmer, with the king laying no claim to it. The only exception was the annual tribute of animal skins presented to the king as gifts.

"The bears are hunted, and whenever the king dispatches a squad to conduct raids in other lands, he receives a portion of it. Additionally, every groom is obliged to either invite the king to their wedding or present him with a portion of the wedding feast. I noticed they lack a conventional method for storing their food; instead, they

dig pits in the ground where they store their food. This food is left to undergo changes over time, often spoiling without being utilised. They only use fish oil giving a distinct fishy flavour to all their dishes. Their culinary practices include preparing barley soup or cooking barley with meat. Those with influence in their society consume the meat, leaving the barley for their servants. However, if the meat is from a goat's head, this is specifically allocated to the servants and followers.

"Everyone wears "galans", a traditional head covering, such that during the king's procession through the marketplace, all present stand and lift their qalans in respect. Similarly, upon entering the king's court, people are required to remove their galans, tuck them under the arm, and greet the king with a nod. No one sits without the king's permission; upon sitting, they adopt a cross-legged posture





and only put their galans upon exiting the court. The king's court comprises several domes, with the largest reserved for the king himself, capable of hosting over a thousand quests. These domes are adorned with Armenian rugs, and the king's bed is centrally placed, draped in Roman tapestries.

"It is their custom that when a man has a son, the man's father takes the child and says, 'I have more right to him than his father does until this child becomes a man.'

"If a man passes away amongst them, his brother inherits not only his possessions but also his responsibility towards the widow, marrying her, although he does not assume responsibility for the deceased's children. I conveyed to the king that such a practice conflicts with Islamic laws regarding inheritance and explained the Islamic system of inheritance until he fully understood its principles.

The town of Gog and Magog was also mentioned in the letter of Ibn Fadlan. He recounted a particular ritual stating, "When one of their men willfully kills another, they kill him in retaliation. If he kills him by mistake, they make a box for him out of birch wood, put him inside it, and nail him up in it. Before sealing, three loaves of bread and a water flask are placed inside with him. Once the box is securely closed, three wooden stakes are erected, and

the box is suspended between them. This act is performed with the declaration, 'We shall suspend it between earth and sky, entrusting it to the mercy of rain and sun, in hopes that the Lord may bestow mercy upon him.' Thus, the killer remains hanging until death ensues.

"When they encounter an individual deemed wise and industrious, their practice is to claim that 'he should serve our lord'. They then seize him, put a rope around his neck and hang him on a tree until he dies. The king's interpreter shared with me the story of a native who, having gained the king's favour and shown considerable wisdom, attracted the attention of local traders. Despite the king's explicit prohibition, the native insisted on joining these traders. Upon doing so, they declared him fit to "serve our lord", subsequently hanging him from a tall tree, where they left him and moved on.

"An odd custom amongst them is observed during travel: if a member of their group attempts to urinate while armed, they attack him, confiscating his weapon, clothing, and all his possessions, leaving him stripped. Conversely, if

one disarms before urinating, he is left untouched and unharmed.

"Adultery is stringently prohibited amongst them, and the penalty for anyone found guilty, irrespective of their rank, is exceedingly severe. They bind the individual's hands and legs to four and then cut the person with a sword from the neck down to the thighs. This fate is met equally by both the adulterer and the adulteress, with each segment of their bodies subsequently displayed on tree branches. Thieves suffer the same brutal punishment as those caught in adultery.

"They maintain farms dedicated to beekeeping, harvesting honey in considerable quantities, and their traders venture into Turkic territories to procure sheep, bears, and black foxes. During my travels, I encountered a group known as Al Burunjar, who had constructed a wooden mosque for prayer. Lacking knowledge of Arabic, they were unable to comprehend their prayers. I took it upon myself to explain the meanings and imparted to them the fundamentals of our faith. Within this group was a man named Talut, whom I initially named Abdullah. However, he expressed a





desire to be named after me, so I named him Muhammad. Following this, he embraced Islam, along with his wife, mother, and children. I requested that he recite after me, 'Praise be to Allah,' and also to say, 'He is Allah, the One.' His repetition of these phrases was filled with a joy greater than if he had been anointed a king.

"Then, the king made his way to a region known as Khallajah, which has three lakes. Nestled between these lakes flows a significant river, leading to the land of the Khazars known as Itil. Alongside this river, a market periodically takes place, attracting a variety of valuable commodities for trade. The Turkish interpreter informed me that within the king's domain resided a man of considerable stature. The king then extended an invitation for us to visit him there, which we accepted. Upon our arrival and after exchanging pleasantries, I inquired about the notably tall man.

"I asked them whether any of the locals had ever slain such an individual. They conveyed to their king, 'We have encountered a man whose mere presence would compel us to abandon our homes.' This account piqued my curiosity, prompting me to request they lead me to this tall man. Upon my arrival, I was confronted with a figure of astonishing height, standing twelve cubits tall. His head was so large it surpassed any conceivable quantity of food, his nose spanned a length of a span, his eyes were enormous, and each finger on his hand measured a span in length. His appearance intimidated me, and I was terrified of him as were the people. We started to speak to him, but he did not speak to us and only gazed at us.

"I wrote to the people of Wisu, with the purpose of asking them about him. They



wrote informing me that this man was from Gog and Magog, [a people] who are three months distant from us. They are naked, and the sea forms a barrier between them and us, for they are located on its shore. The men would usually go out with a knife to catch fish, a quantity that is sufficient for him and his family. However, they often have stomach problems because they eat the fish raw, which sometimes causes death in their community, scares people, and can cause pregnant women to lose their babies.

"Then the king decided to move to another place, and I went with him. We

got to a river named Jaushir, stayed there for two months, and then he sent a message to a group called the Suwaz. The letter said, 'Allah has bestowed upon me the blessings of Islam and the power of the Commander of the Faithful. I am his servant, and this nation has invested me with authority [over its affairs]. Whoever opposes me shall meet my sword.' This message split the people into two groups: one that supported him called Wirigh and another called Eskel, which didn't agree at first but later did. After that, we went back to the city."

Sharjah rescues 195 endangered animals in 2023

The Sharjah Environment and Protected Areas Authority (EPAA) rescued 195 endangered animals and birds and confiscated 2,409 illegal devices designed to imitate the sounds of migratory birds in 2023.

The operation targeted homes, farms, estates, and veterinary clinics across Khudairah, Zubeida, Mahdhab,

Al Jubail, Al Heera, and Al Khazamiya, resulting in nine violations.

Confiscated wildlife included stonecurlews, falcons, seagulls, ducks, a Houbara



bustard, Egyptian geese, baboons, and a pit bull.

Hana Saif Al Suwaidi, EPAA Chairperson, highlighted the importance of adhering

to wildlife regulations, with fines for breaches reaching Dhs100,000. She stressed the need for reporting illegal breeding and trade of endangered and predatory animals

Since 2017, UAE law has prohibited private ownership of wild animals, allowing only zoos, wildlife parks, and research

institutions to house endangered species. The legislation imposes penalties for illegal wildlife trade, including jail terms and fines between Dhs50,000 and Dhs500,000.

Groundwater depletion swift but preventable, study shows

Groundwater is rapidly declining in 71 per cent of the aquifers worldwide, and the decline is accelerating in many places, especially in arid and semiarid regions under cultivation.

Researchers from the University of California, Santa Barbara compiled data from 300 million groundwater level measurements from 1,693 aquifers around the world, spanning the past 100 years. To fully understand the

dynamics of this hidden resource, scientists accessed two satellite data on Earth's gravity.

According to their findings, published in the journal *Nature*, approximately 90 per cent of aquifers experiencing accelerated



declines are located in areas where rainfall has also decreased over the past four years. However, the situation is not hopeless, and depletion is "not inevitable".

The study identified some cases where

groundwater levels have stabilised or recovered, due to deliberate interventions such as aquifer recharge or demand reduction.

For instance, in Tucson,
Arizona, people intentionally refill the aquifer in the Avra Valley from the water in the Colorado River. Storing vast quantities of water underground is much cheaper,

less disruptive and less dangerous, the study

However, such interventions can have tradeoffs. The groundwater discharge has caused the mighty river to dwindle above ground.

Study: Exercise alone can't avert health risks of sedentary work



Modern lifestyle has made sitting jobs the order of the day or the rule, and most of us end up being glued to screens throughout working hours. To counter these problems, many people take on daily exercise programmes which usually last between 15-30 minutes.

However, a comprehensive study involving a large cohort of individuals in Taiwan showed that exercises alone to offset the negative effects of prolonged sitting is not enough. The cure for the

negative effects of sitting is not exercising more. It is sitting less.

The study, published in the journal JAMA Network Open, analysed the data of over 482.000 Taiwanese individuals. with a median age of 39, and whose medical records span an average of 12 years. They found that those who are sitting at work for most of their workday had a 34 per cent higher chance of dying prematurely of heart disease compared to non-sitters. Those who sit at work and have a high-intensity exercise a day can reduce that chance of premature death, but still face the same risk as that of someone who does not sit at work and exercises moderately. The mortality risk for those sitting at work is significantly lowered for those who alternately get up and do physical activities exceeding personal activity intelligence (PAI) 100 a week.

Researchers suggested that companies create a "systemic workplace" that provides standing desks and designated workplace areas for physical activity.

Experts warn of developmental problems amongst preterm babies

Babies who were born moderately preterm at 8 months to late preterm at 8.5 months to 9 months face a higher risk of epilepsy or problems with brain function, motor skills, vision, or hearing compared to those who were born at full term of almost 10 months in the mother's womb.

A study examined the neurodevelopmental outcomes of Swedish children who were born moderately preterm (32 to 33 weeks), late preterm (34-36 weeks), and full-term (39-40 weeks). Around 1.2 million children without defects born at 32-41 weeks between 1998 and 2012 also participated in the study.

Researchers found that children born moderately or late preterm had higher risks of any impairment than children born full term. Risks were highest at 32 weeks (8 months) and gradually declined until 41



weeks (10 months). Children born a bit preterm at 37-38 weeks (9 - 9.5 months) also had higher risks compared to children born full term at 39-40 weeks (9.75 - 10 months). Birth weight for gestational age was inversely associated with impairment amongst preterm children, i.e. the lower the weight, the higher the risk.

Researchers stressed that the risks

should not be underestimated as these children comprise the largest proportion of preterm births – at 80 per cent.

"The findings may help professionals and families achieve better risk assessment and follow-up, and healthcare systems planning for children born moderately or late preterm," the researchers wrote in the peer-reviewed BMJ journal.


